A centre of ecological diversity . . . The montane of Beauvais Lake Provincial Park is host to over 140 species of birds, from Clark's nutcrackers, rubycrowned kinglets, the common loon to osprey, bald eagles and great blue herons. Species such as the sandhill crane, which is classified as a sensitive species in SW Alberta, have been observed nesting in the area.

Park Habitats: Four major habitats are found in Beauvais Lake Provincial Park - fescue grasslands, wetlands, higher elevation Douglas fir, limber pine and spruce forest, and aspen woodlands. This checklist includes information on the residence status (RS) in column 1, the abundance (in habitat) (A) in column 2, and the habitats where species nest (NB) in column 3.


